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Dear Friends:

As I write this I am listening to the choir practicing "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" downstairs. Emmanuel means "God with us" and I am so aware today of God's presence with us in this community of faith. We are greatly blessed by those who worshipped in this space before us, by those who have lovingly built it and who maintain it and by each one of us who prays and worships and continues to build up the spiritual energy here. And we are greatly blessed by the presence of the Holy Spirit. Every time we recognize him here it makes it a little easier for someone else to see her too.



Now Advent is coming and we are focusing on the hope of the last days, the last days of this world order when everything will be transformed and Christ's reign will be fully revealed. We don't really know what that means, but it has been the hope of Christians through the ages, that Christ will come again in a new reality where gospel values are truly lived and everyone is treated fairly. Every Sunday as we gather together we create a little foretaste of the joy of the day when everything is restored in him and pain and sorrow are no more.

So what are we to prepare for, in this season of preparation?

I already know what Jill and I will give each other for Christmas this year. Middle-aged gift giving is not like the eager anticipation of childhood but nonetheless it is sweet. We Christians already know that at Christmas God will once again give the gift of God's unconditional love, wrapped up like a baby in a manger. Just like every other year. It would be easy for this to be ho-hum, rather dull, done-it-all-before.

Yet that God-man child is the most profound though simple gift and we could spend every moment of every day of the rest of our lives pondering the depths of the meaning of the incarnation – God taking on human flesh – God becoming one of us – Emmanuel, God with us. So perhaps our task in preparation is to clean the lenses of our inner glasses, to shed the cynicism and the ho-humness of the season and instead to open ourselves up for a new understanding, a new revelation.

Every Sunday morning I pray that each one of us who comes to church will be touched by the Spirit of God and that none of us will leave exactly the same as we came in. That is also my prayer this Advent... that each of us may be opened up to the grace and presence of God in a new way, that we may see the new in the familiar and that we may be changed. Just like Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, the magi and, I'm prepared to bet, the sheep and donkey were changed by the miraculous and startling events of that Christmas night so many years ago.

Surprised By God! Parish Council Notes

The Parish Council has been talking about next year being the time when we seriously start a campaign to pay off the debt (currently standing at \$458,000). We are thinking of calling it "**Blessing the Future**" and, until very recently, paying off the full debt within a few years seemed an audacious goal.

Then, quite unexpectedly, St. Benedict's was given a gift of appreciated stock which, when sold, will probably bring in about \$400k. So the **Blessing the Future** campaign has a major lead gift already. Praise God!

This has the Parish Council scratching our collective head. Should the **Blessing the Future** campaign become something much more than just repaying the debt? The lead gift is just for capital – for paying off the debt or building and fund development, not for the operating fund. But might it be a springboard to encourage us all not just to get out of debt but to bless the future with... with what?

Here are some of the Parish Council's initial thoughts: a full-time Rectorship; an endowment fund; a fund for major repairs (the roof will need replacing ere long; the veranda railings need to be replaced...); widening the veranda to make hospitality easier; landscaping; a labyrinth; a columbarium; or, or, or...

It is an important time for us to talk about this amazing gift God has given us and to provide direction for future Parish Council decisions. The meeting will be over by 1:30. Please plan to be there... we'll provide some lunch.

St. Benedict's Recycles and Reuses

St. Benedict's collects used batteries, wine corks, printer cartridges, and prescription eyeglasses. for recycling and/ or reuse. This is just one small part of our church's good environmental stewardship.

In California, it is illegal to dispose of single-use alkaline batteries in the trash. Instead, all used batteries should go to a household hazardous waste disposal facility, or an authorized recycling facility. Batteries are considered hazardous because they contain toxic or corrosive materials. Batteries also are recyclable, providing a valuable source of metal.

According to a report entitled, <u>Household Universal Waste Generation in California</u>, <u>August 2002</u>, there were 507,259,000 batteries sold in California in the year 2001. According to survey results published in the report, only 0.55% of these batteries were recycled.



Over 50 lbs of single-use, alkaline batteries have been collected from St. Ben's. We take our used alkaline batteries to Ace Hardware, where they are sent to be reclaimed for scrap metals.

Two dozen printer cartridges have been collected from St. Ben's. Used printer cartridges are taken to Staples office supply store, where they are refilled with ink and used again, or are recycled for their plastic. St. Ben's gets store credit for every ten used printer cartridges.

Over 250 wine-corks have been collected from St. Ben's. Corks are taken to BevMo, where they are shipped off to be be shredded and recycled into new composite corks.

Nine pairs of prescription eyeglasses have been collected. Prescription eyeglasses are taken to the local Lions Club International, for their eyeglass recycling program, which has permanent clinics in Mexico, Peru and Sri Lanka.

Climate Change:

St. Benedict's supports CCA feasibility study

At the October 6th meeting of the San Luis Obispo County Board of Supervisors, item #28 dealt with a proposal for our county to partner with Santa Barbara and Ventura counties to study the feasibility of all three counties forming a regional CCA energy distribution district.

Three members of the St. Benedict's Climate Change committee spoke in favor of the study: Rev. Caro Hall, Alice Welchert, and Bob Pelfrey. What is the significance of this proposal, and why did it draw the support of three members of St. Benedict's community? Good question. Let's begin the answer, though, with another question: What is a CCA?

A CCA- or Community Choice Aggregation- is an energy distribution organization that uses the current distribution infrastructure, e.g., PG & E, as a means for giving each energy consumer in the district a choice in terms of what form of energy they want to purchase. For example, individual energy consumers in Marin and Sonoma counties—where a CCA has been in operation since 2011—may select, say, fifty percent green, ten percent solar, twenty percent coal, etc., according to their individual beliefs on the value of each energy source.

The distributor, e.g. PG & E, is then responsible for accessing energy sources based on the preference/choice indicated by each customer. It should be noted that PG & E spent thirty-five million dollars to oppose the initial level of Marin County's CCA, but their ballot initiative was defeated (The ballot measure would have required a two-thirds vote from county residents). The Marin CCA has proved to be both economically and politically viable over the past four years, as indicated by the interest today in San Luis Obispo, Ventura, and Santa Barbara counties.

There could be cost variables within this system. A customer selecting one hundred percent green, for instance, might have to pay a slightly higher rate that customers choosing carbon-based sources, but any

added cost would be clear to the customer before the choice is made. As a matter of fact, total energy costs in Marin county have gone down since the introduction of the CCA format. The continuing decline in cost for renewable energy promises to bring savings down to the individual level in the near future.

The CCA format therefore not only addresses the overriding issue of climate change, but also transforms the purchase of energy into a more democratic and capitalistic process: a rare win-win for both political liberals and conservatives.

The major reason for members of St. Benedict's to speak publicly before the Board of Supervisors should now be clear. It

continues St. Benedict's commit-

ment to regarding climate change as a religious and moral issue, as seen in the August-September public discussion session on Pope Francis' encyclical on climate change, "Laudato Si". It also affirms St. Benedict's commitment to climate change in by a recent vestry vote- becoming a member of "Interfaith Power and Light", an organization of religious communities supporting the lobbying of elected public officials on climate change issues.

The three people who spoke in support of the CCA multi-county feasibility were thus continuing a policy already set into motion at St. Benedict's: giving the prophetic voice its proper place in this issue that threatens not only the human population but all of the voiceless creatures who depend on us to speak for them...which is the Christian tradition remembers and honors in the life of St. Francis, as Pope Francis has memorably reminded us.

Finally, yes, the supervisors voted to approve the feasibility study. The margin was 3-2. You will be hearing more about this study as its research and recommendations reach the point of public discussion. Meanwhile, St. Benedict's will continue to find ways to speak in a prophetic voice on climate change.
