For Such a Time as This: Foreign Assistance & Humanitarian Aid

Episcopal Relief & Development invites you to join The Episcopal Church and our ecumenical partners, to participate in the #ForSuchATime movement. On the 21st of each month through December 2018, the community is called to pray, fast and act to fight hunger and poverty around the world.

Get ready to pray, fast, and act #ForSuchATime on July 21st for foreign assistance and humanitarian aid.

This July, we highlight programs that work around the world that aim to alleviate hunger, create economic opportunities, promote health, and respond to disasters. The U.S. has a longstanding bipartisan tradition of working to alleviate poverty and responding to humanitarian crises all around the world. At less than one percent of the federal budget, foreign assistance has saved millions of lives and continues to do so today. In fact, we have made remarkable progress in reducing global poverty rates—during the past 30 years, rates of extreme poverty have been cut in half, and we expect more progress in the years to come. To do so, we need to commit to sustained support for foreign and development assistance.

Join us in preparing for prayer, fasting and advocacy in support of our country's critical foreign assistance and humanitarian aid programs.

<u>Pray</u> for an end to extreme poverty and for an end to humanitarian crises, including ongoing famines, around the world.

<u>Act</u> to maintain funding support for vital international assistance programs. Contact your members of Congress on the 21st to urge them to provide sufficient funding for these lifesaving programs of the U.S. International Affairs Budget:

- ◆ Development Assistance (DA): DA is a key piece of U.S. investment in helping the world's poorest obtain access to education and clean water, grow nutritious food, promote economic development, support good governance, respond to environmental crises, and create more sustainable, self-sufficient democratic societies.
- International Disaster Assistance (IDA): IDA provides lifesaving assistance following natural and manmade disasters, including conflicts, earthquakes, floods, and droughts.
- Global Health Programs: U.S. global health funding helps reduce child mortality, slow the spread of
 diseases such as HIV/AIDS, address health emergencies, prevent malnutrition, and support initiatives
 such as the President's Malaria Initiative (PMI) and President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief
 (PEPFAR).
- McGovern-Dole International Food for Education and Child Nutrition: This program gives schoolage children in poverty-stricken countries with what is often their only full meal of the day, and helps protect vulnerable children and their families, especially during societal shocks.
- Food for Peace Title II: Title II food assistance program authorizes the U.S. to confront global hunger and malnutrition and bring stability to situations that can threaten our national security.
- Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC): The MCC aims to reduce poverty through growth in
 investments in areas such as agriculture, education, private sector development, and capacity building.
