## **Protestant Reformation**

It seems that once every 500 years, society and the church goes through a big transition. We're probably in the middle of one right now. The last one was known as the Protestant Reformation. In the 16th century, reformers like Martin Luther, John Calvin and Ulrich Zwingli criticized the Catholic Church – which was the only church in Europe – for its divergence from the Bible. Since many clergy were not literate, and the Bible was only available in Latin which hardly anyone could understand, there were no checks and balances. What the Church taught was believed to be the truth.

The big crunch for Luther came when the Vatican was selling indulgences in order to raise funds. Indulgences functioned like "confession insurance" against eternal damnation because, if you purchased an indulgence, then you wouldn't go to hell if you died suddenly or forgot to confess something. Also, when Luther got to teach a class on Paul's Letter to the Romans he realized that it was in opposition to many of the Church's teachings.

The reformers developed different ideas and different emphases, but all of them agreed that Scripture set the standard for the Christian life. From their ideas grew the Lutheran churches with their focus on being saved by grace through faith; the Reformed churches such as the Presbyterian Church; and the Anglican churches.

Henry VIII, like many European kings and rulers, did not like the power of the Pope when it got in his way and so, in 1530, he declared the Church in England to be independent. However, Henry did not agree with the reformers. He maintained the importance of the sacraments and that the bread and wine are literally turned into Jesus' Body and Blood (transubstantiation.) In fact, Pope Leo X proclaimed Henry "Defender of the Faith" for a book that he wrote opposing Luther.

There was considerable intellectual interchange between theologians on the continent and the English, so leaders in England like Thomas Cranmer, the Archbishop of Canterbury, were influenced by Reformation ideas. After Henry died, the guardians of his young son, Edward, were reformers and so England became Protestant. In 1549, the Book of Common Prayer was first established as the sole legal form of worship in England. However, Edward didn't live long and when his sister (Bloody) Mary came to the throne she re-established Catholicism as the religious tradition of the realm. Many Protestant leaders were burned at the stake.

But Mary didn't live long either, and in 1558 Elizabeth 1 came to the English throne. She devised a Religious Settlement whereby the warring factions of Protestant and Catholic were expected to worship together but not necessarily to agree on doctrine. This led to the development of a new tradition – the Anglicans – who, among other things, liked the Book of Common Prayer and the governance of Bishops. It didn't take long for the enmity between them and Puritans to lead to the Civil War (and also the emigration of Puritans to New England). Political and religious foment continued until 1660 when Charles II came to the throne.

The Episcopal Church developed out of the Church of England after the American Revolution. The Methodist church originated as a revival movement within the Church of England in the 18th century but split away at much the same time as The Episcopal Church.
