Dear Friends:

My heart is full of gratitude for each one of you and for the manifestation of the Body of Christ that we are together.

Most weeks at Vespers we hear about a notable Christian who has brought something special to our life as the church through the ages. This week we heard about Isabel Hapgood, a brilliant linguist who, in the nineteenth century, translated the Russian Orthodox service into English and worked for greater unity between the Episcopal and Russian Orthodox churches. The gospel reading which went with her remembrance was from Jesus' last prayer for his disciples. "I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me."

The unity for which Jesus prayed and to which we are called is not the easy unity where we sweep problems under the carpet and people make nice to one another, but the unity that comes from doing the hard work of looking for ways that we can collaborate across difference, and even become more *because* of our differences.

We are one in the Body of Christ because we are tied together through our communion with Christ. As each one of us intentionally deepens our connection with the divine, so we deepen our connection with one another and so our different gifts and different perspectives can be woven together by the Holy Spirit into a beautiful tapestry of truth and love and holiness. And, because we are connected at a deep mystical level, the spiritual work that any one of us undertakes blesses all of us.

One of the insights of recent decades is how interconnected we are, how interconnected all beings are, so that what one does affects others in a profound way. We are not separate from those who are starving in parts of Africa, those who are in despair on our borders, or those who are making policy decisions which seem to victimize the poor and the marginalized. The way we live does have an impact on the world.



As Bishop Mary reminded us when she was here, we may not see the impact - we may only see the smallness of the seed. As together we create a faith community of hope, compassion and forgiveness, it may seem that we are doing very little to influence our world which seems to be lurching irrevocably towards greater separation and hatred amidst ecological disaster. Yet as we seek to deepen our unity with one another at the same time as being active citizens in our world, we are sowing the seeds which in the reign of God flourish and become great trees.

The Fire Sprinkler System is Coming

Starting about July 10, the fire sprinkler system will be completed and the new tanks and pump installed. We will be completing the fire sprinkler system which was partially installed when the building was first moved and remodeled. At that time we did not have the money to complete the installation and the County told us that we did not need fire sprinklers provided we have a heat alarm system, which we do. When we were completing the Great Room they reversed their earlier decision and told us that we must put in a fire sprinkler system if we are to do anything in the future that requires a permit (like add solar panels, expand the parking lot etc).

Thanks to very generous donations we have the money to go ahead with this expensive project. We have to get bigger water tanks and more electricity to run the pump which we hope never to have to use! The interior work of reattaching and installing additional sprinkler heads will be done first and then the exterior work will follow.

General Convention

The General Convention of the Episcopal Church meets every three years to worship together and to consider resolutions that will guide our common life in the coming three years. Each diocese sends four lay and four clergy deputies who meet in the House of Deputies. Just as in Congress, all legislation must pass in the House of Deputies AND the House of Bishops with exactly the same wording. Committees composed of bishops and deputies consider all the proposed legislation and decide on the wording which will be presented to the two houses.

Alongside the legislative process there are many, many different meetings and gatherings and a huge exhibition hall which has information about everything Episcopal. The Episcopal Church Women have their triennial meeting at the same time as Convention and most groups and networks hold a gathering during Convention.

Everyone has the opportunity to gather for worship each day with a variety of liturgies and different preachers. Sarah Chesebro will be attending the convention as part of the national altar guild team. Please support her with your prayers

How often do you say, "I love you" to someone you do love?

Our priest, Laurie+, here in Reno at St. Catherine of Siena Episcopal is on a three week vacation on a cruise ship (this time to ports around the Baltic Sea). I believe she is working at getting the hang of learning to really relax since her retirement at 72 is fast approaching early next spring. That's another congregational discernment/selection process that is in the works.

Therefore I was handed the church cell phone, a flip phone of ancient vintage that befuddled me for a while. Alas, I finally, mostly have the hang of it, "mostly" being the operational word here. And, Laurie+ has also forwarded the church related emails. So, it is that several days ago I received an email asking me to contact a woman I will call Margaret.

Margaret told me that her husband David was diagnosed with a brain tumor. There followed an operation where that tumor was removed only to discover 4 more tumors. Malignant brain tumors-stage 4. That kind of news would rock anyone to his or her very foundation. The woman was beyond frantic and distraught wondering how they were going to deal with that. We talked about taking a deep breath—many of them in fact, in order to give the shock a chance to settle out.

Today we talked again. Now there has been an opportunity to think about what can be done treatment wise and an opportunity to see what is important in the scheme of things as they are. She says it may seem silly to say, but she told me they have really always loved each other, but never were really verbal about it. But now she says her husband says to her "I love you" every chance he gets. She says it makes him so very happy to say it, and she says it makes her just light up to hear it. And, she takes every opportunity to tell him that she loves him.

We know God loves us, and I suspect we also know that our families and friends do as well. So, my brothers and sisters, I ask you as well as myself, how sometimes it takes a dire circumstance to remind us that perhaps we should keep that foremost in our thoughts and also take *every* opportunity to tell those who touch our lives, "I love you"! And ...don't forget to tell God too!

We are envisioning a set number of participants (6-12) who would commit to a number of weekly meetings (8-12) over a two to three-month period, in order to have continuity, build trust, and maintain healthy sense of community. If you believe you may be experiencing some form of grief due to circumstances you are facing, think you might benefit from the opportunity to address it, and are interested in exploring this more deeply in a group setting, please consider joining us.
