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#### **Dear Friends:**

This is a difficult time for many of us, as we see events unfolding on the national stage which are far from having the trademark of the gospel of peace, humility and love.

It is a continual challenge to find ways to resist the onslaught of anger and fear mongering without ourselves getting caught up in name-calling and demonizing. Yet resist we must. This country is built on the talents and hard work of immigrants as well as the gifts of the indigenous people. As an immigrant myself, I feel strongly the slights being hurled indiscriminately at immigrants, and the suggestion that we are a threat to the country. Resist we must, but we must resist in a way which does not turn us into the image of those whom we are resisting.



That is the essence of non-violent resistance. We resist violence in creative ways, always refusing to be drawn into the violence itself. The gospel reading for the last Sunday in November, the last Sunday of the church's year – The Reign of Christ – is the confrontation between Pilate and Jesus. Pilate who has the brutal force of the Roman Empire behind him and Jesus who has – what? Apparently nothing, but actually the power of the reign of God behind him. The power which is not of this world.

And that is the power that we have. We can look violence in the face and see it for what it is, cruel, brutal and ultimately powerless.

But that is not a reason to turn away and ignore racism, sexism, anti-Semitism and whatever the word is for hating and targeting transgender people. Violence may be ultimately powerless but it is nonetheless real, especially to those who are being targeted.

I encourage you as you read or listen to the news to pray not only for those who are being persecuted but also for those who are perpetrating and perpetuating violence, that God may transform their hearts into hearts of generosity and peace. It isn't easy to pray for our enemies or for the enemies of our friends, but it is not only what Jesus showed us but what he specifically taught us. And let us have the courage to speak up whenever we see oppression. Even when it is in ourselves.

Most of us are the beneficiaries of white privilege. We take many things for granted. Let us think deeply and creatively about those who do not share our privilege and find ways that we can be in relationship with them. The Abundance Shop and Laundry Love both give us many opportunities to show greater honor to those who are oppressed by our society.

Let us have the courage to build the reign of God here in Los Osos,

There are several opportunities for you to engage in prayer, alone or with others, outside of scheduled services:

The chapel is available for private prayer at any time but especially when the office is open; Tues-Thurs 9:45 to 12:45.

Prayer chain members receive requests for prayer at any time through the email address prayers@stbenslososos.org. Members commit to pray for each person for two weeks and to keep information received through the prayer chain confidential. If you would like to pray for others in this way, please ask Danna to add you to the list of pray-ers.

Every Sunday (except the 5<sup>th</sup>) a member of the Healing Team is available after the 10:30 service to pray with individuals who have particular concerns.

### **Homeless Outreach**

As the weather gets colder, those who are living outside need more help. We have the privilege of serving dinner at the Los Osos Cares Community Dinner on Monday November 5 and lunch at the new Prado 40 center in San Luis Obispo on December 1st.

Steve Hirahara is coordinating the Los Osos Cares/People Helping People/SBCC Warming Shelter this year. The shelter is housed either in the South Bay Community Center or the Schoolhouse behind it and is open when the forecast is for temperatures below 34degrees or a 50% chance of precipitation.

We will need people to (1) set up in the evening (2) bring dinner (3) serve dinner and hang out with the guests (4) to stay for a night shift either 9pm-1:30am or 1:30am – 6am (5) people to provide breakfast and (6) to put stuff away and make sure everything is clean by 6:45am. Many hands make light work and you can volunteer for more than one shift on the same day. Please let Steve know how you can help.



Once the shower unit arrives there will also be a need for volunteers to welcome guests, provide clean towels etc. and to clean the showers in between uses.

The Safe Parking group is still looking for a parking lot to use as a pilot project for authorized parking. If you know anyone who owns a parking lot in town please let Caro+ know.

The memorial service for Sandy Ybarra who many of us knew through Laundry Love and other community events will be on Dec 8 at 11am at the Community Presbyterian Church in Nipomo.

This non-partisan educational event will help participants understand the critical immigration issues of our day. Through presentations, panels and workshops, each participant will gain an understanding of what leads people to leave their home countries, the issues immigrants in our community face, the responses of faith groups on the border and the rich cultural diversity of our area. We will also be talking about how faith groups can respond.

Rev. Alexia Salvatierra is the author with Dr. Peter Heltzel of "Faith-Rooted Organizing: Mobilizing the Church in Service to the World" (Intervarsity Press) and the founder of the Faith-Rooted Organizing UnNetwork. She is a Lutheran Pastor with over 35 years of experience in community ministry, including church-based service and community development programs, congregational and community organizing, and legislative advocacy. Rev. Alexia Salvatierra is also an affiliate professor at Fuller Theological Seminary at Centro Latino and the School of Intercultural Studies.

#### St. Benedict's Profile: Barbara Hirahara

Beginning in this issue, we are profiling a member of St. Benedict's Church as a way to build relationships and learn more about the wonderful things we are doing to share God's love.

Barbara Hirahara's heart is for those she describes as the "disenfranchised from the community." They are people who live in their cars, in bushes, are alcoholics, drug addicts, or living in poverty. "The majority are from Los Osos, they really are our neighbors," she says.

Barbara is involved in three primary programs to help meet the needs of such neighbors: Laundry Love, Community Dinners and the Warming Shelter, which is a project of Los Osos Cares. The non-profit Los Osos Cares started in June 2016 to provide community-based services in collaboration with faith-based and government agencies. Barbara remains involved in Los Osos Cares and also volunteered in the organization's Resource Center, which offers services, referrals and access to information to the Los Osos community.

"In my experience, we are seeing people who want to live here in Los Osos," says Barbara. "They have children and grandchildren here. I've met people who grew up here - some even know one another from high school."

Barbara sees herself in the people she serves. She struggled with drugs and alcohol as a young mother in Fresno and was facing eviction from her apartment when she decided to seek help, first through support of an Alcoholics Anonymous group, and then as part of a small Narcotics Anonymous group that worked to expand the program.

"When I decided to get clean in 1982, there was only one NA group from Kern County to Modesto that met once a week for 90 minutes," says Barbara. "So the 12 of us that met in that group had to get clean, work the program and build our group to reach more people, by leading and starting more NA groups."

She says there are now more than 500 NA meetings in the Fresno region.

"I got to be a part of that root group, it was amazing that God picked me for such a ministry," says Barbara. "I have a real feel for people who are hopeless. I thought I was hopeless. We've got to work harder to love one another. Once others feel that love, and they discover they can trust somebody – that's when the change comes. That's when it all starts to happen."

Barbara and her husband Steve, who also volunteers in local homeless and poverty services, have attended St. Benedict's Church since they moved to Los Osos in 2010. For more information about getting involved in the Los Osos Cares Resource Center, please call (805) 592-2701.

#### Earth Care: On Care of Creation: on Dec. 2

On Sunday, Dec. 2, St. Benedict's will welcome *Mr. Jeffrey Diehl*, Vice Chair of the legislative committee responsible for the 79<sup>th</sup> General Convention resolutions related to Care of Creation. The convention, held July 5-13 in Austin Texas last summer passed 19 resolutions out of 29 originally proposed on Care of Creation.

All are invited to join the Earth Care Committee after the 10:30 service to hear Jeff tell us about these resolutions as they offer direction and leadership to Episcopal congregations. Jeff is a member of our neighbor parish, St. Barnabas, Arroyo Grande.



**In summary**, these actions of General Convention are reported as follows:

- Together, the new legislation creates a new staff role at church headquarters for the Care of Creation, encourages parish action and commitment on a wide variety of things
- continues grants for local environmental ministry projects, continues support for the church's UN climate-change conference delegations
- supports marginalized communities impacted by environmental racism as well as communities impacted by the transition away from fossil fuels
- calls on church staff to use carbon offsets when they travel
- recognizes that water is a human right and urges churches to ban plastic water bottles
- expresses support for using local food at church events
- opposes a new oil pipeline on Ojibwe land and drilling on sacred Gwich'in lands
- lays out next steps on fossil-fuel divestment
- supports carbon-tax policies, and much more.
