

What Is Climate Change and What Are Its Consequences?

Opening Prayer

Bible Study (10 - 15 minutes)

Our scriptures, and perhaps our entire human history, are stocked with stories of disasters (often of our own human making) followed by deliverance. Biblical examples include:

- The Genesis flood followed by the Noahic Covenant with all life,
- Enslavement in Egypt followed by Exodus to the promised land,
- Jesus Christ's crucifixion followed by resurrection and ascension,
- Paul the persecutor turned into Paul the apostle

What other remarkable turnarounds com to mind?

Do you agree that we need a remarkable turnaround now, from environmental destruction to environmental justice?

One of the great but less-often noticed turnarounds in our scripture happened in the Babylonian exile, in the sixth century BCE. Nowhere is that transformation more focused than in Ezekiel 34. Almost everything said and done by the exiled prophet Ezekiel before Ezekiel 34.10 is doom and desolation. Almost everything after 34.12 is hope and renewal. Read aloud some of the last things Ezekiel said about the disaster in his day and its causes: (Ez 34.2-10, 18)

"Thus says the LORD God, 'Ah, you shepherds of Israel who have been feeding yourselves! Should shepherds not feed the sheep? You eat the fat, you clothe yourselves with the wool, you slaugh-

ter the fatlings, but you do not feed the sheep. You have not strengthened the weak, you have not bound up the injured, you have not brought back the strayed, you have not sought the lost, but with force and harshness you have ruled them. So they were scattered, because there was no shepherd.... "Is it not enough for you to feed on the good pasture, but you must also tread down with your feet the rest of your pasture? When you drink of cool water, must you foul the rest with your feet? And must my sheep eat what you have trodden with your feet, and drink what you have fouled with your feet?"

Question to Discuss: Ezekiel spoke this indictment of the "shepherds" (rulers, persons entrusted with privilege, power, and responsibility) in about 586 BCE. What does this speak to us "stewards" (managers, persons entrusted with privilege, power, and responsibility) today about environmental degradation? How have we like shepherds gone astray?

Yet God in Ezekiel makes the pivot especially in verse 15, "I myself will be the shepherd of the sheep." (an identity which Jesus owned for himself especially in John 10.11-16). Read now the first of the new things Ezekiel declares must come (Ex 34.25-27a)

"I will make with them a covenant of peace and banish wild animals from the land, so that they may live in the wild and sleep in the woods securely. I will make of them and the region around my hill a blessing; and I will send down the showers in their season; they shall be showers of blessing. The trees of the field shall yield their fruit, and the earth shall yield its increase. They shall be secure on their soil; when they shall know that I am the LORD, when I break the bars of those who enslaved them."

Question to Discuss: Never mind the poor foxes, bears and jaguars; Ezekiel doesn't mean they'll disappear, only that they won't imperil humans. But Ezekiel is probably speaking of what we would call regenerative agriculture here, and much more besides. What does a redeemed world and humanity look like in Ezekiel's prophesy? What is our role in that world?

Climate Change Discussion (10 - 15 minutes)

When did you personally become aware that climate change is a serious problem? Are you convinced that the climate change that is occurring is due primarily to human activities, especially the burning of fossil fuels?

In the future how to do you see climate change affecting

- ⇒ this country?
- ⇒ you personally?
- ⇒ your children or grandchildren?

Additional Activities

Go outside and look around. What changes do you predict will occur in 50 years? What feelings do you have when you contemplate the changes that will come?

Read Psalm 38 (it's pretty much a pure lament, a cry for help.)

- ⇒ Ask each participant to identify with some kind of creature on God's earth a sapling, a coyote, a sand dune, a rock, whirlpool, whatever, so long as it is some real earthly particular thing they can picture.
- ⇒ Ask each to imagine their creature as affected by climate change. (Easy if they are a polar bear, different if they are a hurricane, but just, how they feel in the face of climate change.)
- ⇒ Ask them to pick one verse or part of one verse in Psalm 38 that expressed their experience as they face climate change.
- \Rightarrow Ask each to briefly share with the group,
 - ♦ "My name is _____(might be some personal name, Jake, might be some species, yarrow, ursus horribilus, might be some combination. "I'm Jake, a Jackal.""
 - ♦ The verse I feel as I face the realities of climate change is. . . .,
 - ♦ Why I chose that verse is. . .
 - ♦ What I hope for myself and my kind is. .

Leader wraps it up with silent, then spoken prayer. . .and the closing verse 22, "Make haste to help me, O LORD, my salvation."

Closing Prayer

When the animals come to us asking for our help, will we know what they are saying? When the plants speak to us in their delicate, beautiful language, will we be able to answer them?
