



Reader: A Reading from the book of the prophet Jeremiah



1 Thessalonians 3:9-13


Lector: A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Thessalonians

Jesus said, "There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in a cloud' with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near." Celebrant: Come, Lord God, change us and we shall be changed.

Come, increase our awareness of your presence.

Come, strengthen our love for you. Come, fill our hearts with holiness.

Come, awaken us to be ready and watchful for your coming.

Come, Lord God, change us and we shall be changed; through him who lives and

reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Celebrant: Lift up your hearts,


We lift them up to God.

From the grip of all that is evil, free us.



Look, the Body of Christ is broken for the life of the world. Here is Christ coming to us in bread and in wine.


The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.


This is God's table, and all are welcome here.



First Sunday of Advent - Hope

The Gospel of John speaks of Christ as the true light coming into the world. In commemoration of that coming, we light candles for the four weeks leading to Christmas and reflect on the coming of Christ. It is significant that the church has always used that language—the coming of Christ—because it speaks to a deep truth. Christ is coming. Christ is always coming, always entering a troubled world, a wounded heart. And so we light the first candle, the candle of hope, and dare to express our longing for peace, for healing, and the well-being of all creation.
