


Celebrant: Blessed be the one, holy, and living God.

1 Corinthians 15:35-38,42-50


Someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven. What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

Luke 6:27-38

Gospeller: The Holy Gospel of Our Savior Jesus Christ According to Luke.

People: Praise and Glory to God.

Jesus said, "I say to you that listen, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. Do to others as you would have them do to you.

"If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful.

"Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back."

Lord, you are our delight and our joy, we seek to reflect your grace and goodness: make us slow to anger and not too ready to condemn. God of peace, we pray for peace-givers and peace-makers. We pray for all who are seeking to bring reconciliation and hope to communities and peoples. We remember today the work of Amnesty International, the United Nations and the peace-keeping forces of the world. God of love and hope, give us your peace.

We remember all who have hardened themselves, or become insensitive, all who are afraid of being moved or touched, all afraid of close contact, all who are suffering from a breakdown in relationships. God of love and hope, give us your peace.

We remember with love all who are struggling at this time, all who realize that they are perishable beings through illness or disability: may they be strong in the spirit and strong in the Lord. We pray for all whose lives are disturbed or distressed. We pray especially for friends who are ill or in need, remembering especially those for whom our prayers have been asked and for those who are in our hearts.

God of love and hope, give us your peace.

We rejoice that in our God we are more than conquerors. In your power, O Lord, we will overcome all evil, we will triumph over death and rejoice in life eternal. We pray for loved ones departed, that they may rest in peace and rise in glory.

God of love and hope, give us your peace.

God of grace and glory, give us the gift of generosity, that we may reveal your love and forgiveness, and live in fellowship and peace with each other as we work for the coming of your kingdom; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

People: And also with you.



Celebrant: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

People: *And also with you*. Celebrant: Lift up your hearts.

People: We lift them to our God.

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Holy One.

People: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Celebrant: It is our joy and our delight to give thanks to you our Creator God for the wonder of Creation; for the signs of your presence in all life and particularly in the life of your people.

From the very earliest times when the cosmos was just coming into being, you have called us to share your life with you, called us to be your people, your royal priesthood. You reveal yourself to us in the beauty of sunsets and the magnificence of great waves; you reveal yourself to us through the scriptures and the words of the prophets.

Above all, you reveal yourself to us in the life and teachings of Jesus the Christ, in his death and glorious resurrection.

And so we join with the angels, archangels and all who have gone before us as we sing the song which echoes through the ages:



The Celebrant continues:

Your Word, incarnate in Jesus, walked among us, teaching us your ways, showing us how to be your daughters and sons.

Jesus taught us to live a gentle life of non-violence, resisting the paths of empire, resisting all the forces that push us to division and hatred, and instead, loving and forgiving not just our friends but also our enemies. It was his obedience to this path that led him to the cross, to die an ignominious death at the hands of the occupying forces encouraged by the religious establishment.

Yet even in his time of distress, he called for forgiveness. We thank you that in him we are forgiven, and ask for the grace to forgive those who harm us, that we may walk in peace even as Jesus taught us.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, Christ Jesus took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said,

"Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Recalling now his suffering and death, and celebrating his resurrection and ascension, we await his coming in glory. Accept, O Lord, our sacrifice of praise, this memorial of our redemption.

May our lives be radiant with your praise and glory.

Send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts. Let them be for us the Body and Blood of your Son. And grant that we who eat this bread and drink this cup may be filled with your life and goodness.

Send your Holy Spirit also upon us,

that our lives may be transformed and we may show forth your life in the world, loving and forgiving, walking the path of non-violence as Jesus did.

Make us into one holy people of God. Make us into one holy people of God with all your people of every persuasion.

This we ask through your son Jesus Christ.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, All-Compassionate Father, now and for ever. AMEN.

The Lord's Prayer


Celebrant: As our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray...




The Blessing


