



Reader: A Reading from the Second Letter to Timothy


As for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for

teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

Sermon

Affirmation of Faith

cf Philippians 2.6-11

Let us affirm our faith in Jesus Christ the Son of God.

All: Though he was divine,

he did not cling to equality with God, but made himself nothing.

Taking the form of a slave, he was born in human likeness.

He humbled himself and was obedient to death,

even the death of the cross.

Therefore God has raised him on high, and given him the name above every name: that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, and every voice proclaim that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Prayers of the People

We give you thanks for all who proclaim your power, peace and presence.

We pray for preachers of the word and ministers of the sacrament, for those who are priests and pastors in our community, especially Bishop Lucinda, Caro+ and Jen.

We remember all who are teaching about God and for those seeking to learn more; we ask you to guide our teachers and to bless us in our learning.

Savior, show us your way, teach us your path.

We ask your blessing on all who work in the judicial system, for judges, lawyers, juries, clerks and court reporters. We remember all who seek to keep law and order, we pray for the police and for probation officers that they may act fairly and with integrity.

Savior, show us your way, teach us your path.

We pray for all experiencing injustice and a lack of freedom, for all who suffer wrongly and are oppressed. We remember especially the people of Iran and of Haiti, and those in this country whose lives are blighted by racism and environmental injustice. We pray for all refugees and migrants. Savior, show us your way, *teach us your path*.

We give thanks for all who have shared their wisdom and learning with us; for teachers, tutors and mentors, for Sunday schools and day schools, and for Messy Church. We remember all who are deprived of education, all who are indoctrinated, all who have learning difficulties. We pray that we may learn to listen, be sensitive and open to others. We ask you to guide us and our loved ones at all times.

Savior, show us your way, teach us your path.

We remember before you all who have lost their way, all who have lost their grip on reality, all who are deluding themselves or others. We pray for the confused, the harassed, the dejected, especially for any whose minds refuse to cope and those suffering from memory loss or Alzheimer's disease.

Savior, show us your way, teach us your path.

We remember especially those for whom we have been asked to pray and those who are on our hearts this morning starting with those in the bidding book...

Savior, show us your way, teach us your path.

We give thanks that you seek us out and lead us to you and eternal life. We remember before you friends and loved ones who have died and are now living in a fuller knowledge of you and your presence. Savior, show us your way, *teach us your path*.

Loving God, you are always ready to love and accept us, always more ready to hear than we to pray; teach us to abide in you and know you abide in us, to place ourselves in your presence and your peace, and to live and work to your glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord who is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever, Amen.

Confession and Absolution

Let us confess our sins to God.

All: God of all mercy, we confess that we have sinned against you, opposing your will in our lives.

We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created.

We repent of the evil that enslaves us, the evil we have done, and the evil done on our behalf.

Forgive, restore, and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ, that we may abide in your love and serve only your will. Amen.

Celebrant: May the All-Compassionate God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. *Amen*.






People It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The Celebrant continues

Even when we failed to respond to your gift of love and abundance, and went our own ways, in your infinite patience you became one of us. In your Son Jesus, you took on human flesh and lived and taught among us.

And in so doing, Jesus the Christ reconciled earth and heaven, bringing us into right relationship with you, not on the basis of our merits but through grace alone. As his ministry and mission took him relentlessly toward his death on the cross he gave us an example of perseverance in prayer and in faith.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you.

Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said,

"Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant,

which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Recalling now his suffering and death, and celebrating his resurrection and ascension, we await his coming in glory.

Accept, O Lord, our sacrifice of praise, this memorial of our redemption. Send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts. Let them be for us the Body and Blood of your Son. And grant that we who eat this bread and drink this cup may be filled with your life and goodness.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ.

All By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and for ever. AMEN.


The Lord's Prayer

If God is calling you, you are welcome and invited to receive communion.


