Epiphany is here and the days are getting longer as the light returns. Tomorrow the sun will set later than today. By one minute. I won't even notice.

If I were Jesus, I might say "The kin-dom of God is like the coming of the light after the winter solstice. It starts so slowly that it is imperceptible but it grows and grows until one day we notice that the days are longer, and we rejoice."



I have faith that the days are getting longer but I can't see it. The difference is too small for me to notice without looking it up on the internet. This is the challenge of faith. The writer to the Hebrews wrote, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen... By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible." (Heb. II:1,3)

Everything starts on the inner, in the world that is not visible. It starts with prayer, with thought, with intention, with the breath of God. There are many things starting in our communal life right now and many of them are still unseen; this New Year is a time for bittersweet excitement and anticipation.

The Discovery Team working with Deacon Jen has been making new relationships and deepening connections with our neighbors through Octoberfest and the Advent Pop-up. This is preparing the way for new ministry and new opportunities to share God's love beyond the walls of the church. The Transition Team is creating opportunities for us to think about the journey we have taken as a church in the thirty plus years we have existed and the places we are going as we follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

For many years we did not have a building and so we used the analogy of pilgrimage for our life together and invited people to "come journey with us"; since we have had the church we have been far more aware of place and have moved through "nurturing the mind and soul of Los Osos" to "a place for all people." These are all valid and useful statements about the way God is calling us to build God's kin-dom. I wonder what will come next? I wonder what our collective thinking and dreaming will lead us to?

I wonder what God is already preparing "by the word of God" for the next phase in the life of this faith community?

With the writer to the Hebrews, we can have "the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" that just as the days really are getting longer, so God really is doing a new thing among us. And we can participate in that new thing that is not yet visible by our prayer that God will lead us in the paths that s/he is preparing for us, by our intention to create together the faith community of the future whatever that may turn out to be, and by our faithfully following the word of God as we hear it.

I am grateful for each one of you and especially for those in leadership in this congregation for your faithful service and witness to the incredible and unconditional love of the God of the universe. I am excited to see how God works at St. Benedict's in 2023.

Our Team has been very busy meeting with Bishop Lucinda and Canon Martha to plan our next steps as we approach Rev. Caro's retirement.

Our next steps are designed to prepare us to write our Parish Profile. The Parish Profile is a highly detailed document that describes St. Benedict's: its mission and ministry, its people, its past, present, and future, and the context in which we work and worship together in Los Osos and beyond. We will need the full participation of everyone in the congregation to ensure that we have the most thorough, most complete, and most comprehensive Parish Profile so that we can find the best fit for our future Rector.

Frequently Asked Questions About Transition

Q: Why are we doing this process?

Whenever a clergy person leaves or enters a congregation, the dynamics of the congregation change. What we know to be true at a certain time in the history of the congregation may not continue to be true in this present time. Clergy are called to serve congregations at different points in the history of that congregations, and the needs, circumstances, and yearnings of the congregation change. This parish isn't the same as it was in 1993, or 2003, or even 2013. The transition process is about rediscovering who we are, what we are called to become, and who we are called to serve.

Q: How long is this going to take?

This is a question that is asked often during the process. The simple answer is, "It takes as long as it takes." Search processes are affected by the time it takes to get everyone on board to form a Search committee, complete the parish tasks of transition, write the profile, have Vestry and Bishop approve of the document, interview prospective candidates, and find the right clergy fit for the parish. It can take a few months or several years. The standard amount of time is generally about 12-18 months. Because we are doing a "search in place" and beginning the process before Caro+ leaves, we hope that the entire process will be complete during the 2023 calendar year. We hope to finish writing the profile and have it approved by the time Rev. Caro leaves in May. Then we will begin the search and interview process.

O: What is the difference between a call and a hire?

A Call is based on a discernment process, inviting the identity and context of the parish, and the dreams of the parish to partner with what God's dream is for the parish. The entire parish is involved in the discernment process all along the way, so that the Holy Spirit is at the center and revelatory in the prayerful process. A hire for a job is based on skills and qualities, with an aim toward meeting very specific needs, in an often measurable, quantifiable way. A "hire" seldom would involve an entire organization, nor is it usually prayerful, although it may be thoughtful.

Q: What is the role of the Vestry during time of Transition?

The Vestry is charged with over-seeing the day-to-day operations of the parish, with attention given to administrative support, ministry teams, buildings and grounds, finances, communications, and pastoral care. They ensure that the basic requirements of reporting and canonical responsibilities are maintained. The Vestry selects the members of the Transition Team and then lets them do their work. Vestry members stay well-informed, communicate frequently, and work well together and in collaboration with the Office of the Bishop to maintain clarity and transparency.

Q: How can I help?

It is very important that you serve on the many ministry teams of the parish that need good, positive leaders during this time of transition.

Q: Who do I contact with questions, comments, or suggestions?

Your Transition Team is Brian Spolarich (chair), Alan Kiste, Michael Lucas, Roz Malone, Lorienne Schwenk, and Jane Wu. You can also chat with any Parish Council member.

And, don't forget to pray!

O God our Firm Foundation, you have blessed St. Benedict's with our wonderful Rector, Caro+. I especially thank you for (the aspects of Caro+'s ministry that are particularly meaningful to you). Be with me, I pray, and be with all of us as we to celebrate Caro+'s many gifts. Be with Caro+ as she too celebrates her time among us. We pray in the name of Jesus, who with you and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns with you, one God, forever and ever. Amen.

O God of Every Transition and Change, we remember to you our friend, our future Rector. We do not yet know them, and they do not know us. But we ask that you will fit and knit us all together so that we will all have hearts, minds, and spirits open to that "still, small voice" that directs us toward your will. In the name of the Spirit who shelters us, the Son who walks with us, and you the Parent who watches out for us, together in the Trinity. Amen.

Building and Grounds

You may have noticed that things look a little different around the parking lot. We received a generous gift from the family of Pat Armstrong, who planted two new toyon trees on the parking lot berm and also paid for a significant amount of landscaping around the parking lot and memorial garden. On a sadder note, our regular groundskeeper, Alice Smith, pointed out that one of the cypress trees is having difficulty, and when Liz Maruska followed up with the tree experts, they found three cypress which have cypress beetle and will need to be removed.

After some discussion the Parish Council has agreed that we need to update the grand landscaping plan to take account of the water tanks and the need for permanent vehicular access to them. The most recent grand plan calls for a columbarium and a labyrinth. We don't want to plant trees only to realize that they are where we want to put something else. So, the Parish Council has asked the Landscape Committee to restrict further general planting to two additional trees until a new plan is in place.

It seems appropriate to wait for the new priest before working on the new plan.

We are going ahead with plans for a new heating system. The current gas furnaces are limping along but could need a major repair anytime so the Parish Council has agreed to replace them with electric heat pumps. These are more environmentally friendly than gas, and one day we will get solar panels which will make them even more economical. The heat pumps are on order so we hope to see them installed in the next few weeks. This is made possible by your donations to the Building Fund.

Finances

We ended the year with about \$5000 more income than we budgeted. However, back when we agreed the budget, we expected to exceed our income by \$32,000 so this still leaves us pulling a significant amount from reserves. This was necessary because we decided to pay Caro+ full-time.

Later in the year, the opportunity to engage Deacon Jen also came up and the Parish Council decided to go ahead on faith, paying a portion of their salary, which adds another about \$12,500 expenses in 2022.

The Abundance Shop continues to be an abundant blessing, and this year brought in net income of over \$50,000 even though a new carpet was fitted and other repairs made. We tithe 10% of the income, sharing the abundance with other non-profits in the area.

So, when the dust settles on the end of year accounts, we will be well in the red for 2022 but able to cover this from special gifts and bequests. However, it is clearly not a sustainable level of expenditure for St. Ben's at its present size.

Annual Meeting

Our annual Church Meeting will be held on February 5th after the 10:30 service. This is a special and important meeting as it will largely be used for work towards the transition from Caro+ to our next permanent priest. Canon Martha will be with us to lead that portion of the meeting.

We will also do our regular annual business meeting in order to elect new Vestry/Parish Council members and deanery delegates; approve the budget for 2022; hear the Rector's report and hopefully get feedback from the Parish Survey. If you would like to serve on Parish Council or as a Deanery and Diocesan delegate, please talk to Esta Kandarian or Sandy Fisher. Please plan to participate even if you don't attend church regularly.

Whatever the circumstance, a thin place is where God and humanity meet in a mysterious way. These moments open us to places of rawness and beauty. When we enter into a thin place, something seems to break open inside us, and words are inadequate to describe what we are experiencing. In these moments, we feel a sense of breakthrough as we break free of the ordinary and experience the extraordinary amid our daily lives.

Drawing on her Irish-Celtic heritage, Julianne Stanz helps us explore those times and holy places of transformation. Inspired by faith and guided by spiritual practices, we can experience each thin place as a point of departure on a sacred journey to a truer understanding of who we are meant to be.

Ed is grateful to Hannah Jay and to Caro for their consistent support and for helping assure that the newsletter is available to all. And thanks to everyone for reading!





St. Benedict's Earthcare Team


