This is the last time that I will be writing this column as your rector and priest. Jill and I have been members of St. Benedict's for most of the last thirty-one years and it has been a privilege to be raised up among you for ordination, and then invited to be your priest and eventually your rector.

This is a big change for all of us, and it is a time of grief as well as hope and even excitement. Every change has an aspect of grief, and every occasion of grief builds on past experiences. The other day, I found myself sobbing uncontrollably over the death of Rachel Espinosa, three years ago this week. My grief at leaving you brought up that older pain and I realize how little I wept at the time of her death, when we were all trying to make sense of the beginning of Covid.



Each one of us responds differently to change and to grief. As a faith community we have experience both of coming together, and also of shattering apart in conflict in the midst of sudden change. My hope and prayer is that we have been sufficiently intentional about this parting that you will pull together as the midwives of the new church, the new St. Ben's that is coming into being.

The disciples did not have the privilege of knowing well ahead of time that Jesus would be leaving them. It was a rapid change, first the horror of the crucifixion, then the surprise of the empty tomb, then the joy of Jesus' occasional visits and finally the ascension and (wait, wait there's more), Pentecost! The coming of the Holy Spirit changed everything.

They did not have long to process their grief before they were given a new task and had a growing community to lead. God knew that this was coming and Jesus had given them hints but nonetheless it was a surprise.

I don't know what God has in mind for St. Ben's. I am sure there will be times of surprise. I also know that the qualities of openness, hospitality, faithfulness, service, and great conversation which have been part of our DNA from the beginning will continue. I look forward to seeing what God is doing in the midst of this congregation and how she is continuing to bless the wider community through you all.

May the road rise up to meet you.

May the wind be always at your back.

May the sun shine warm upon your face;
the rains fall soft upon your fields and until we meet again,
may God hold you in the palm of her hand.

A Report from Your Transition Team

Over the last several months, the Transition Team has been hard at work planning transition events such as the Church Survey, the Storytelling Gatherings, The History Taking event (facilitated by Canon Martha), the Neighborhood Walk (organized and led by our fabulous Discovery Team), and our recent Roles and Responsibilities event (also facilitated by Canon Martha). All of the information we've gathered is currently being written into a draft of our Parish Profile. This draft will be given to our Search Committee for improvements before they give it to the Vestry for approval and then send it on to Bishop Lucinda for comments and edits. Then it will be posted and visible at a national and diocesan level.

Speaking of the Search Committee, we need to form one! Is there a particular ministry of the parish that you're passionate about that you want to make sure is a priority for our new rector? Is there something about our worship that is deeply meaningful to you and you want to see continue? Is there something you've always wished St. Ben's do together, but we've never found the right way to implement? If any of those are true, or you just have a

spiritual calling to think about the next stage of our life together, being on the Search Committee is a great way to make sure your views are represented as we search for our next rector. This is the most important work of the church right now: choosing a new rector. The Vestry wants to ensure a broad range of



voices contribute to the search process, so please fill out the brief "Statement of Interest" form located on the Usher's Table (or ask Hannah to mail you one). These are due May 7 to enable the Vestry to choose a committee at the May Parish Council meeting. The Search Committee will then conduct the search process, including interviewing new rector candidates and presenting a slate of possibilities to the Vestry.

The Transition Team is also assisting the Parish Council in other transition events:

- 1) Caro's farewell party. St. Ben's knows how to have a great time together and this party will be something to remember! The date is May 19. The Parish Council is looking for donations to defray the cost. Please write "Farewell Party" in the memo line of your check or make contributions online at our website.
- 2) The Rutter "Requiem", requested by Caro+ and performed by a combined choir of Deanery Churches on May 21 at St. Barnabas, Arroyo Grande. Please join us for this beautiful work of sacred music.
- 3) Caro's final worship at St. Ben's, May 31. The bishop and many of our friends and church family will be gathering to worship together to officially say goodbye.

There are so few — too few — days we have left together worshiping and working with Caro. The Transition Team hopes we can all make a special effort to spend the next several weeks taking every opportunity to show up, be present, remember, and celebrate Caro's wonderful ministry at St. Ben's.

What will church life look like after Caro+ leaves and before a new rector is chosen? The Transition Team and Parish Council is working to make sure we have pulpit supply during this time. We're hoping that most weeks will be a typical St. Ben's Eucharist with the Liturgy Committee and Music Committee working together to plan the Sunday service. There may be some Sundays when we cannot find someone who can celebrate Eucharist, and then we will use the Liturgy of the Word. This time of transition will require patience and mutual forbearance as everyone will be doing the best they can to continue without a permanent rector (and no Music Director). If you have interest in serving on either the Liturgy or Music committees, please contact Sarah Chesebro or Brian Spolarich.

Some have wondered if or assumed that Deacon Jen will "step into Caro+'s role after she retires". So as to clear up any potential misunderstandings, that is not the plan. Deacon Jen can currently preach, and once they are ordained in June, can serve as part of our pulpit supply. But under the diocesan Trailblazer program guidelines they cannot become our next rector, and neither will they be providing clergy leadership to the parish apart from the Trailblazer/Discovery Team process.

According to church canons, once Caro+ leaves, she cannot come back to St. Ben's for at least a year, and then must be invited by the new rector. Therefore, we need to spend the next several weeks being intentional about saying our goodbyes.

And, don't forget to pray!

O God our Firm Foundation, you have blessed St. Benedict's with our wonderful rector, Caro+. I especially thank you for (the aspects of Caro+'s ministry that are particularly meaningful to you.) Message from our Presiding Warden

Happy Spring to everyone! The season of change, growth and new beginnings in so many ways. We have many events happening in the next few weeks and we will need each other for support and to remember what a wonderful church family St. Ben's is to all of us.

Hopefully we have your application to be on the Search Committee, which is due to me by May 7. We would like a broad spectrum of members to be part of this search for a new rector for St. Ben's. The Vestry/Parish Council will select the Committee after May 7. The Parish Profile will be created, then presented to the congregation for final comments. We will be wanting to showcase, in the best way possible, our Parish to a prospective candidate.

We hope to see you at Caro's Retirement Party on May 19, Friday 6:30PM. Then we have two special services, Sunday May 28 Caro's last official Sunday with us and the bishop will be here on Wednesday May 31 for her service to bless Caro+ in her future retirement.

I ask for your support and many prayers during this time. We will have several different clergy here to assist us with Sunday services over the next few months. Our church family will be available to help in any way we can as well. Please feel free to contact me, if I can't find a solution, I will ask for others who may have other solutions.

Highlights from the Parish Council

Your parish council has been busy organizing the many activities associated with the rector transition, farewell, and search process as well as ongoing parish business. Specifically,

- We're going solar! Our proposal to work with the non-profit RE-volve to finance and install solar panels has been approved by the bishop, standing committee, and board of trustees. We were able to have the necessary agreements in place in time to secure the most favorable rates with PG&E. We now have 2 years to get the project started.
- Thank you to Hannah and Bill Gaines Audio Inc. for the resolution of the problems with our audio / visual system. You'll hear the difference!
- The parish council approved our land acknowledgement statement.
- The parish council agreed to explore ways to enhance the effectiveness of our image in the community including new signage for the Abundance Shop and possibly a new logo.

Finances

Our total income in the first quarter has been higher than budgeted because (1) several people paid their full pledges in advance and (2) the Abundance Shop was twice as abundant as we had budgeted — contributing \$18,000 to St Ben's so far this year. As a result, income is \$33,000 ahead of budget but much of this is the effect of receiving income at the beginning of the year that had been budgeted to come in over 12 months.

Expenses were about \$3,000 less than budgeted — most of this comes from the lack of a regular musician. We hope that that will not be a savings for much longer! As a result, although we had anticipated a loss of \$27,000 by this point, we actually have an extra \$10,000 in the bank. Thanks be to God.

Land Acknowledgement Statement

What is a land acknowledgement statement and why are they important? According to Kaitlin B. Curtice, author of "Native: Identify, Belonging and Rediscovering God," land acknowledgements are a way of naming the traditional people of the land and the grace with which the land always cares for us as human beings. They are a way to make room for difficult conversations that are still relevant today by asking us to look at creation narratives we tell ourselves about this nation that often neglect to acknowledge the resilience of Indigenous peoples. Curtice invites us to consider that "land acknowledgement is about listening, it is about remembering, and it is about rejecting invisibility."

St. Benedict's parish council has adopted the following land acknowledgement statement.

We acknowledge with gratitude the yak tit^yu tit^yu yak tiłhini (ytt) / the Northern Chumash People, and the Salinan Tribe / the T'epot'aha'l, "People of the Oaks," on whose ancestral homelands we gather, and whose vibrant culture continues today. May we always remember that the Earth does not belong to us, that we belong to the Earth, and that we are all relatives in life. Help us to be instruments of justice and peace for all people in today's world.

Blessing of Beneficial Fungi for Soil Health and Carbon Capture

As an extension to the 10:30 Earth Sunday worship (April 16), the Earthcare committee invited interested worshipers and guests to process to the site of the bioreactor on the northwest corner of the property. After safely negotiating the bumpy, grassy ground (squirrels), Caro+ said a blessing and Earthcare member Don Maruska commented on the significance of the bioreactor.

The bioreactor has been growing a form of naturally-occurring "super-fungi" since its construction some fourteen months ago (November, 2021), and the results are truly amazing. The bioreactor has produced approximately five hundred pounds of mycorrhizal



fungi material which can enrich depleted soils. The process is known as "regenerative agriculture". The fungi compost will not only be used on St. Benedict's property, but also be available to members of St. Benedict's and community partners. The bioreactor project is another example of St. Benedict's finding a way to use its modest resources in a way that benefits not only our own congregation but also the larger community.

Earthcare Team Engages Community with Earth Day Events

Over 60 people attended Earthcare's April 15 event, "Visualizing Climate Change and a Just Transition." Citizens Climate Education, ResilientSLO, and Rotary Los Osos sponsored it with St. Ben's Earthcare Team. What's Needed for a Just Transition to a Climate Healthy Future?

In the second part of the workshop, entitled "What is Needed for a Just Transition", there was a screening of the film "Nation in Transition" produced by the American Resilience Project. Interfaith Power and Light has made this film available a part of its Faith Climate Action Week (April15 -22). The theme of the Faith Climate Action Week this year is climate justice - a fair and just transition to clean energy.

Nation in Transition follows the coal to solar energy transition in the Navajo nation and across Northern Arizona through the stories of all those involved in the transition, including workers in the coal plant, utility executives and environmental activists. The film presents an excellent example of a just transition. Displaced workers at the coal plant were able to continue working in other jobs for the utility company, and many Navajo households that hitherto had lacked electricity were provided with electricity by means of local solar panels. Although the film shows only one example of a just transition, according to Interfaith Power and Light "the film offers a roadmap for just energy transitions for workers and communities everywhere."
