A Report from Your Search Committee

We have reached an exciting milestone in our transition process with the completion of a draft of the Parish Profile, which was sent to the Parish Council earlier this month. This is a significant accomplishment and represents the culmination of work that began with our first transition-related meetings in January. Thanks be to God! Canon Martha, our transition consultant, said of our latest version: "This profile is BEAUTIFUL. This profile is one I'll be using as an example for other parishes."

What's next for the Profile? Here's the process:

- The Parish Council has completed its review of the Profile and provided feedback to the Search Committee, which we will incorporate into another version.
- Once the Parish Council is satisfied, the Vestry (that is, the confirmed Episcopal members of the Parish Council) will vote to approve the Profile.
- Our Presiding Warden Maureen will then send this to Bishop Lucinda for her approval.
- If the Bishop has any changes, it goes back to the Search Committee, then approval by the Vestry, and then approval by the Bishop.
- Once the Bishop has approved, we will post the final version of the Profile on our web site and share it widely with the congregation at that time.

The Parish Profile is intended to be a relatively short document (ours will be around 10 pages) and should be an accurate and compelling description of St. Benedict's as a parish, with the purpose of attracting clergy for whom we would be a likely good "mutual match". In secular terms, this is essentially a very detailed job advertisement. So, while the Profile is important, the ultimate purpose is to attract clergy to apply, and invite them into conversation with us.

As a reminder of the process so far, everyone was invited to provide input into what would ultimately go into the Profile through the congregational meetings and other transition-related activities in the first few months of the year, and the Search Committee has worked faithfully to synthesize and incorporate this into the words of the Profile. We all elected the Parish Council, and the Parish Council appointed the Search Committee, to do this work on our behalf.

Looking forward, once we have finalized the Profile and published it, we will post a job advertisement on the Episcopal News Service web site. We are also developing "first round" interview questions which I will discuss with Canon Martha in early October and we will finalize soon.

In response to parishioner feedback, the Parish Council has decided to change our welcome statement from "Whoever you are and wherever you are on your faith journey, there's a warm welcome for you here!" to "You are warmly welcome at St. Benedict's for who you are and where you are on your faith journey." We believe this more fully expresses our desire to positively affirm the radical inclusiveness we feel in our hearts.

It is a challenging task to discern and articulate our common future as a synthesis of our many perspectives, lived experiences, and hopes and dreams. We invite you into conversation with us and with each other as we seek to live out our mission in Los Osos and beyond, using our vision as a centering tool for that work.

Our Vision

We embrace the fact that the world around us is changing, and along with it, the role of mainline traditional churches like St. Benedict's. We must seek new ways to embody our mission as followers of Christ in order to continue to thrive today and in the future. We dream of collaborating with our rector to imagine and build new ways of engaging in our community that push us to grow beyond traditional "outreach" methodologies.

Specifically, we hope

- to identify new ways to be relevant to the current challenges and modern lives of people around us;
- to explore new forms of worship including music;
- to continue the work of the Trailblazer Discovery Team to extend the church's reach beyond our land and our building to find new ways to bring the Holy Spirit out into our community;
- to continue to work on our own ability to manifest an environment of full inclusion; and
- continue to be in the vanguard on issues of environmental stewardship.

Finances

We continue to be in a good financial position for 2023. Income is over budget due to early payment of pledges and strong Abundance Shop sales. The impact of using supply clergy in the absence of a rector, combined with the open music director position mean we continue to see lower expenses due to reduced salary and benefits. The combined effect puts us \$62k ahead of budget year-to-date. Thanks be to God! Once we have our new rector and music director onboard, we will have more consistent salary obligations. Looking ahead, it is important to remember that over a multiyear period, the trend is toward fewer pledge dollars. Thank you in advance to our Finance Committee as they help us manage these changes.

Season of Creation

The Season of Creation has its roots in the Orthodox Church, where Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitrios I proclaimed September 1 as a Day of Prayer for Creation in 1989. In 2003, the World Council of Churches extended the celebration to October 4, the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi. It is now celebrated by billions of Christians throughout the world. The Season of Creation has been celebrated at St. Benedict's for a number of years.

This year we used a resource from the Diocese of Massachusetts in the liturgy for the 10:30 Eucharist. The resource suggests readings and prayers around the theme of Creation for each Sunday in the Season. The liturgy committee invited the members of our Earthcare team be the lectors during the Season of Creation and to choose the readings and prayers for the Sunday they are reading.



This Season calls us to reflect on the beauty and abundance of God's creation and reminds us of our responsibility to care for it. According to the resource from the Diocese of Massachusetts celebrating the Season of Creation is even more important this year because of the urgency of the climate and ecological crisis and the need for a bold, prophetic response.

Why is it important to mark the Season of Creation?




Discovery Team

It's hard to believe we are more than half-way through our two-year Trailblazer partnership with Rev. Jen. We started on this journey last year by applying for a diocesan grant to co-fund this half-time position. The Trailblazer mission as stated in the grant application is "to help the congregation move into the exploration and implementation of what it means to be New Church." Congregations applying for a Trailblazer grant must be willing to

- Ask and answer challenging questions about the future—both parish and community.
- Be open to uncertainty and opportunity.
- Imagine a new and different role for the church in the community.
- Discuss uncomfortable topics and potential losses.
- Re-explore the history of the parish and community with an eye toward patterns and possibilities.
- Forge new relationships with other faith partners and local agencies.
- Embrace the leadership of a new and often young clergy leader.
- Do things we've never done before.
- Walk faithfully into the unknown as the New Church emerges.


Spiritual Conversation
