An Update from Your Search Committee

As announced at the Annual Meeting, our Parish Profile was approved by the Bishop, and has been published on the St. Benedict's website. The web address for our Profile is:

www.stbenslososos.org/parish-profile/

This is an important milestone and the result of the discussion, feedback, engagement, and prayers of every member of our parish. We worked hard to create a profile that was a faithful representation of who we are as a parish, what makes us distinct, our hopes and challenges, how God is at work in our community, and who we are seeking to lead us into the future. Anyone who participated in any of the transition related activities in the past year has contributed to the document, even if you did not write the actual words. Please note that while feedback is welcomed, this document cannot be changed without approval again by the Vestry and Bishop.

This document should also be understood first and foremost as an advertisement, a way to attract candidates who might be interested in our opportunity to learn more about us, and to invite them into relationship with us for a conversation. In other words, while this is "about us", it is not primarily "for us".

Our call is for a ¾ time position, which we discussed at the Annual Meeting in some detail. Our budget cannot support a full-time call at this time, and the financial gap (around \$40k/year) is more than a "stretch". Although Caro+ was full-time at the end of her tenure, this was done in part to help increase her pension benefits after retirement and required spending savings and one-time funds to cover the difference. We know that the current clergy job market is challenging for congregations (there are more open positions than clergy to fill them), but this is our current reality. We will pray that God provides us an abundance of candidates, and that one will be right for us and we for them.

Looking forward, the next steps are:

- Post our job advertisement on the Episcopal News Service "Jobs & Calls" web site: www.episcopalnewsservice.org/jobs/ This is the primary place that Episcopal clergy will look for new opportunities. Our position will be posted for two months, including for at least a week after Holy Week.
- Conduct implicit bias training with members of the Search Team to ensure we are following fair and legal hiring practices.
- Schedule Zoom calls with first round candidates after they have sent their application materials to Canon Martha. She will perform a basic screening and forward applications to the Search Team. The Search Team is charged with presenting at least two candidates to the Parish Council to bring forward for in-person interviews.
- Conduct in-person interviews second round candidates with the Parish Council and Search Team. This interview would occur over a two-day period, and would include formal interviews, a home Eucharist and sermon, tour of the local community and our campus, meeting with the Bishop, and informal conversation over shared meals.

Based on the outcome of these in-person interviews, the Vestry would call a candidate as our Priest-in-Charge with a renewable three-year contract.

• Many thanks to all the members of the Search Team and Transition Team who have labored with great care and diligence to get us to this moment.

For the past eight months, St. Benedict's has been faithfully and lovingly 100% led by our lay members. Thank you so much to everyone who continues to make this a vital beloved community! We have been so blessed to have Rev. Jen Crompton, our supply clergy, and lay Ministers of the Word lead us in worship and walk with us on this journey. In addition to not having a permanent priest yet, we continue to search for a musician to accompany us during worship so that Ann Lucas can enjoy her own much-deserved retirement. In both the search for a priest and a musician we are challenged by a shortage of job seekers, but continue to trust that the Holy Spirit will show us our path forward.

For the business portion of our meeting, we elected our new leadership; congratulations to

Long Term Financial Planning and the Search Process

Our transition and search process has presented us with the opportunity to look at our financial planning through a new lens in additional to the annual budgeting process. Both 2023 and 2024 are atypical years for our finances because of the difference between funding supply clergy and a permanent priest. In 2023, we had a full-time priest for half the year. In 2024, we have funds budgeted for a new priest but do not really know when that person will come. The good news is we are able to save up some reserve funds while we have supply clergy, but we also have the uncertainty that comes with the timing of the search process.

To support the search process, the vestry needed to understand what funding will be available for our new priest as they begin their long-term ministry with us. By analyzing trends in income and expenses over multiple years, we reached a few important conclusions.

- The Covid pandemic and transition period make it difficult to create a smooth comparison over recent years.
- While we were able to achieve full-time status for Rev. Caro prior to her retirement, this included using reserves and one-time sources of funds such as PPP loans and special gifts designated for that purpose.
- While income from the Abundance Shop is increasing, regular pledging has been impacted by the departure of donors passing away, moving away, or leaving the church. So, while total income is growing, it is not growing fast enough to support calling a full-time priest at this time.
- We are the fortunate beneficiaries of a bequest from the Faye Hogan estate, which we will offer as a housing equity share as part of our 'terms of call' for our priest.
- We continue to share the hope that God's abundance will enable us to support a full-time clergy salary in the future.

Star Party

We gathered together on Friday January 5th to celebrate Epiphany with our annual Star Party. After a delicious potluck supper, Liz Maruska, Maureen Titus, and Berkeley Johnson each found the traditional coin in their piece of cake, designating them our Epiphany royalty. Following the star, they processed through the sanctuary to the creche to commemorate the journey of the three wise men. Everyone was invited to take a "star word" for the year for reflection and then we removed the Christmas decorations, blessed the church, and marked the lintels with a chalk blessing for the new year.

Quiz: what is the significance of the designation "20+C+M+B+24" on the lintels? It stands for the Latin words *Christus Mansionem Benedicat,* which means "May Christ bless this house." The letters also stand for the



traditional names of the Magi who visited Christ: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar.

Key Takeaways from COP28

When I was less than year old, folk singer Ed McCurdy wrote these words: "Last night I had the strangest dream, I ever dreamed before. I dreamed the world had all agreed to put an end to war. I dreamed I saw a mighty room; the room was filled with men. And the papers they were signing said they'd never fight again."

It's not that simple. Yet I think of that song whenever I think of the countless details and negotiations that go into global meetings like COP 28, the UN sponsored gathering in December of 2023. COP28 brought together over 97,000 delegates including 150 heads of state to take common action on climate change. Dreams of peace and ecological well-being can only be realized through countless actions undertaken by people and sometimes opposed parties working together. As I read of what the parties at COP28 meeting in Dubai agreed upon, I find hope. Not so dreamfully easy as signing papers to end all war. But in real waking life, COP28 seems to have taken many steps to move us closer to ending our war on nature and building an ecological civilization, including the following.

- Four pillars to addressing climate action were set: a.) fast-tracking a just, orderly, and equitable energy transition (essentially to renewable sources b.) fixing climate finance; c.) focusing on people, lives, and livelihood; d.) underpinning everything with full inclusivity. Examples under those four headings follow.
- World leaders pledged to triple renewable energy capacity by 2030. The economics of producing renewable energy are improving. Presently human efforts produce about 388 gigawatts of renewable energy annually, growing in 2023 by 450 GW. The intent is to be adding over 1000 new GW each year.
- Mobilization of funding from private and governmental sources is ongoing and increasing. For example, the
 Green Fund has received new contributions totaling \$12.8 billion, and a new fund for Loss and Damage to
 least developed countries was adopted, with pledges by December of \$770 million. Equally important,
 multilateral development banks all over the world are adopting frameworks for greening the financial
 system and expediting nature conservation, such as the Nature Solutions Hub for Asia and the Pacific.
- Building resilient food systems that adapt to climate change impacts is vital. 153 national governments
 committed to a Declaration on Sustainable Agriculture, Resilient Food Systems, and Climate Action. 140
 national governments joined the Declaration on Climate and Health which commits to strengthening of
 health systems present and future. 200 leading NGOs signed a Call to Action for Transforming Food
 Systems for People, Nature, and Climate.
- A Youth Climate Champion was appointed, and ongoing input from youth increased. The Podong Indigenous Peoples was launched, providing funding directly to indigenous peoples for projects they will administer. COP32 was charged to report in detail on the Gender-Responsive Just Transitions and Climate Partnership on which at least 78 nations have recently signed.
- The lists go on. Most of the efforts I've noted here come from a "Summary of Global Climate Action at COP28" which lists 57 areas of actions undertaken.

They didn't sign just one paper to put an end to war. It will take much more than that. I do ask people to neither ignore the annual COP meetings nor to easily agree with pundits who say "it doesn't do nearly enough." Those pundits are very probably right. Yet...we need to do what we can and appreciate what we can. May God help us to bring good dreams to reality.

Lent

Lent is upon us – that challenging season when we remember that we are mortal and that we are mired in sin and at the very same time remember that God's grace meets us where we are.

Ash Wednesday

Lent starts on Ash Wednesday, February 14th. We will be offering Ashes to Go at the Abundance Shop from 7:30 a.m. – 11 a.m. immediately followed by a Prayer Pop-up and a service in the church at 7 p.m.

Holy Week

Palm Sunday

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday on March 24th when we remember Jesus' triumphant ride into Jerusalem. There will be an 8 a.m. service with Blessing of the Palms. The 10:30 a.m. liturgy will also begin with Blessing of Palms, Procession, and Passion Gospel.

Stations of the Cross

Walk the Via Dolorosa – the way of tears – which is also the Way of Peace and of Hope, as we follow the story of Jesus' journey to the cross and beyond. The wonderful Stations were gifted by the Hirahara family and made for us by Chloe White: Tuesday, March 26th at 7:30 p.m. and Good Friday at 2:15 p.m.

Maundy Thursday

On March 28th at 7:00 p.m. we will remember Jesus' last supper with his friends and the subsequent betrayal in the Garden of Gethsemane. After a simple Eucharist with (optional foot-washing) the church is stripped of all its color and artwork, ending with the stripping of the altar, reminding us of how Jesus was stripped naked. We depart in silence, just as his disciples left him, silently melting into the night.

Good Friday

We will mark the day when Jesus was crucified with a traditional Good Friday liturgy on March 29th at 12:00 noon. The church will be open for prayer and meditation from then until 2:15 p.m. when we will walk the Stations of the Cross.

Holy Saturday and Easter Vigil

On Holy Saturday March 30th we will remember the time when Jesus was in the tomb. Then ... finally we get to Easter, but we can't quite wait until Easter morning, so we celebrate the night of Jesus' resurrection starting just after sunset, at 7:45 p.m. on Saturday with the Great Vigil of Easter. During this ancient service we light the new fire and bring light into the church for the recounting of our salvation history. Then, after we have renewed our Baptismal Vows, we celebrate the resurrection in a joyful singing of the Gloria before celebrating the first Eucharist of Easter.

Easter Day Sunday

On March 31 our celebration continues on Easter Morning with a contemplative communion service at 8:00 a.m. and a Festival Eucharist at 10:30 a.m.
